

Ageing in Asia: Challenges and Opportunities

Introduction

The world's population is undergoing a historic transformation, with unprecedented rates of ageing, particularly in parts of Asia. In this course, we will study this demographic shift, focusing on the unique experiences of Asian societies as they confront rapidly ageing populations. We will analyse the social, economic, health, policy and cultural impacts of this change, exploring both the challenges and the opportunities it presents. Through critical analysis, students will gain valuable insights into the complexities of ageing in Asia and the strategies needed to foster a future where all generations can thrive.

Course Objectives

By the end of this course, students should be able to:

- 1. Describe global population changes and interpret population ageing from social and demographic perspectives.
- 2. Examine how the ageing process presents both opportunities and challenges from multiple perspectives.
- 3. Understand the health, economic, and social implications of ageing.
- 4. Identify and apply concepts and practices related to active ageing and quality of life, including lifelong learning, social participation, and age-friendly cities.
- 5. Develop the competence to identify emerging topics important for future research and practice.

Teaching Methodology

Interactive class activities and discussions will be integrated to encourage critical thinking and allow students to apply concepts in practical contexts. Case studies and real-world examples will be utilised to illustrate key points. Additionally, group project and presentation will foster collaboration and deepen understanding of the course material.

Premchand Dommaraju is an Associate Professor of Sociology and Director of the MSc in Applied Gerontology programme at Nanyang Technological University. Findings from these studies have been published in academic journals such as Social Science and Medicine, Demography, American Journal of Epidemiology, and Journals of Gerontology Series B: Psychological and Social Sciences, amongst others.
