# HL0201/ HL5002: Images of Singapore: Literature, Film and Culture

# **Course Description:**

In large part, images – textual or visual – inform how we perceive the world around us. Especially in today's digital world, images proliferate our lives and screens, undoubtedly influencing how we comprehend the societal events happening around us.

The question that then follows is, to what extent do representations of Singapore inform our understanding of the workings of Singapore society? In the same vein, to what extent can one's current notions of contemporary Singapore help them appreciate depictions of Singapore in literature and film – and by extension, the (trans)national, socio-political, and historical contexts in which they are produced?

Based on these lines of inquiry, this course explores various depictions of Singapore through the reading of literary and filmic texts, with the view of investigating how these representations either inform or challenge our understanding of the predominant narratives of Singapore's culture and identity.

# **Learning Outcomes:**

Students will be expected to:

- 1. Identify and engage with representations of Singapore in literary and filmic texts.
- 2. Produced informed critical responses (in the form of the midterm essay and final exam) that involve close-reading and analysis of their chosen text(s) from the syllabus, as well as apply optional secondary research.

#### **Course Assessment:**

- 1. Midterm essay (1300 words, ± 15% upper/lower limit): 50%

- 2. Final examination: 50%

### **Generative AI policy:**

Generative Artificial Intelligence (AI) has become more ubiquitous in recent times. In this course, students are allowed to use Generative AI, but only in specific ways:

- Midterm essay: It is acknowledged that AI tools may be useful when gathering information from
  different sources or assimilating information to aid understanding. Students may use AI tools in
  brainstorming or creating an outline for the midterm assignment, but the final submitted
  assignment must be the student's original work, written and produced by the individual
  student alone.
  - In other words, students are <u>not allowed to copy or paraphrase from generative Al</u> tools or apps generative Al is only allowed as a planning or brainstorming tool.
  - Citations: Citing generative Al is <u>not accepted</u> in this course. You are expected to cite your primary and secondary sources directly.
- **Final exam:** Students are **not allowed** to use Al tools in the final examination.
  - Respondus Lockdown Browser will be used for the final exam, which blocks any webpages
    or apps other than the examination page from being opened during the exam period.

These are the course's generative AI guidelines, given the potential concerns the course instructor has anticipated at the point of writing the syllabus. These may be further refined in consideration of any relevant developments in the fast-evolving domain of AI.
