Overview

This course is an introduction to the history of the Islamic world from before the time of the Prophet Muhammad to the present day. Throughout this course we will consider key historical events, individuals and concepts from diverse parts of the Islamic world. We will consider the continuities of principles and practices central to Islam, as well as the diversity of Islamic and Islamicate expression over time and space. Using a range of primary sources and key texts in ongoing scholarly debates, we will critically engage with a number of enduringly relevant themes.

- The tutorials will be held on Friday afternoons between 1430 hours – 1730 hours at TR+119 Tutorials will take one hour for each group.

Learning objectives

- Establish an understanding of the major events in the history of the Islamic civilizations.
- Familiarize with the essential beliefs and traditions of Islam.
- Understand the impact of the context in the development of beliefs, rituals, history and common sense.
- Develop and demonstrate critical and analytical historical thinking.

Some Rules

Weekly Readings

The weekly readings are assigned to help you with your understanding and familiarization with the subject discussed in the class. In an ideal world, it is expected you to do your weekly reading, nevertheless in a realistic setting it is not essential. However, the weekly reading of primary sources assigned for the tutorial sessions are expected and will be evaluated as part of participation in tutorial activities.

Academic Honesty

The universal rules regarding academic honesty will be strictly enforced in this class. Chicago style (full notes-with-bibliography) should be adopted for all written work. Any written work has to be submitted through turnitin and papers with over 24% similarity ratings (excluding small sources and quotes & bibliography) will be returned to be re-written within 24 hours.

Late work will incur a penalty of 10% of the maximum grade for every 10 hours. Extensions may be granted until 4 days before the deadline in exceptional cases (and some creative penalty will be applied). Assessment

Participation in tutorial activities (10%): This component will be made up of your attendance at the tutorials, weekly reading responses and any other in-tutorial activities.

Group presentations (20%): For this component you need to present on the choice of your topic out of the ones provided, during class hours.

Essay (20%): 1500 words essay, on the topics provided, is due on April 9th, 1700 hours.

Final Exam (%50): As part of the NTU regulations there will be a final written exam. The exam will be open book on the 8th of May 2019 .
