Course name: Archaeology of Cambodia: Landscape, Settlement & the Demise of Angkor

Course Description

This course provides an overview Cambodian archaeology, dealing with over 3000 years of Khmer culture, with a focus on the rise, daily life and demise of its medieval capital Angkor. The syllabus deals with three main subjects in a general chronology: the development of archaeology as a discipline, the evolution of Cambodian urbanism until the early modern period, and the history and state of research at Angkor. Themes include the limitations of text-based narratives; change and continuity in Khmer society; social-ecological dynamics; and demise, transformation and resilience.

Learning Objectives

Students will be familiar with the broad outlines of Cambodian history until the early modern period, have a general understanding of Khmer culture, and will develop a capacity for critical thinking. By analysis of recent research, consideration of the historical context of conventional narratives, and by scrutinizing the divergence between materiality and textual sources, students will be able to relate the themes and issues within Khmer studies that are relevant to the broader disciplines of history, archaeology and cultural anthropology.

PDFs of weekly reading material will be provided by the instructor.

Assessment criteria

- a. Class participation and presentation (10%)
- b. An annotated bibliography (25%)
- c. Mid-term test in Week 7 (25%)
- d. A 4,000-word research paper (40%)

Course Requirements

Participation: You should attend all classes and complete the assigned reading material each week prior to class.

Annotated bibliography: Prepare an annotated bibliography (200-300 words each) on 10 articles written in the last 20 years.

Mid-term test: A combination of multiple choice, short answer and essay questions.

Research paper: Complete a 3000-word research paper drawing on material from lessons, reading material and your own research. You will choose your own topic through consultation with your instructor.
