




Background


- Because English is increasingly becoming a dominant language in Singapore, mother tongue languages may be considered as heritage languages in many cases.
- Factors such as early oral language development, home environment, one's confidence and interest, teachers' beliefs and practices have been identified as important to the maintenance of
- The role of such factors in maintaining students' Tamil use in Singapore is currently under researched.

Pattern of Tamil use in and out of classrooms









Oral language development and developing speaking skills as most relevant purposes of teaching. Reasons spanned across themes such as early exposure, language acquisition, confidence and making Tamil a living language.

Methodology



- Online teacher questionnaire
- A quantitative summary and a qualitative review of questionnaire responses was undertaken to gain a more holistic approach.
- A pilot phase was used to help gauge the effectiveness of the questions, receive feedback and revise the questions to yield a more succinct and clear survey.
- 30 teachers, 10 from K, P, S, respectively participated in this anonymous online survey.

Conclusion

- Similar patterns of students' Tamil use at homes and in classrooms.
- Perceived confidence and interest of students' use of Tamil coincides with the amount of actual language use in and out of classrooms.
- Factors related to heritage language maintenance are also key contributors to current students' Tamil use in Singapore.
- In contrast to prior studies, the findings highlight that students' Tamil usage increases as they grow up, through school experiences and conversations with peers
- Possible suggestions to ensure Tamil language strives as a living language in Singapore could be encouraging early exposure, sensitising parents in using Tamil at home and involving the Tamil community in Singapore.
